





GRAND MARSHALS

Rose Parades are nothing new to the 1977 Tournament of Roses' Grand Marshals, Roy Rogers and Dale Evans, two of the most respected and popular entertainers in show business and western history. Both have been featured on floats during six previous parades. Roy has also ridden several times on horseback.

Their selection, by Tournament President Carl E. Wopschall, marks the first time in the 88-year history of the festival that a husband and wife have been chosen for the coveted honor.

"The theme of the 88th Tournament of Roses is 'The Good Life,' " stated Wopschall, "and the selection of Roy and Dale was a natural.

"Throughout their 40-year show business careers, they have continually given a slice of the good life to millions."

The Rogers' family has adopted four orphans and appeared at more than 5,000 charitable functions. Countless honors have been bestowed upon the pair for their unselfish service to humanity.

Their careers have included films, television and records.

Today, Dale is an author of best sellers. Her most recent, "Let Freedom Ring," was her 14th book.

After a long absence, Roy has recently returned to the motion picture screen with the hit "Mackintosh and T.J.," his 91st film. Meanwhile, he has traveled extensively in behalf of his many business activities throughout the United States and Canada.

The pair has raised a family of nine children and are the grandparents to 16.


PAST GRAND MARSHALS

Roy Rogers and Dale Evans are not the first Tournament of Roses'Grand Marshals of western fame. The late Los Angeles County Sheriff Eugene Biscailuz, a native of Southern California and noted law officer, led the procession in 1937.

The following year, Leo Carillo, popular movie star, descendant from one of the elite Spanish California families, and expert horseman, was a tremendous hit with the crowds.

Both revived the early Rose Parade tradition of having the Grand Marshal lead the parade on horseback.


"Movie Memories" was the theme in 1973, as one of the all-time greats of cinema and western fame, John Wayne, was selected Grand Marshal.

PRINCESS MARGARET PRICE



The idea for a Pasadena Rose Parade was conceived in 1889, when Dr. Charles F. Holder, a newcomer from the East Coast, suggested a midwinter community festival to members of Pasadena's prestigious Valley Hunt Club. Along with Dr. F. F. Rowland, he envisioned a floral procession, followed by an afternoon of sports. These events would provide the opportunity to send pictures to friends across the country.

What better way to "advertise" Pasadena's New Year's Day sunshine, roses and oranges to an otherwise freezing nation? Holder and Rowland figured it might even persuade others to purchase property in Southern California.

On January 1, 1890, a tradition was born.

Rowland named it the Tournament of Roses. Later, real estate boomed.

By 1895, the event had become so large and complex the Valley Hunt Club withdrew its sponsorship, and the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association was formed.

Eastern newsmen covered the parade for the first time in 1898. Their reports hinted that someday the event might receive world-wide media coverage.

By 1901, the first automobiles were allowed in the line of march, but were relegated to the rear to avoid frightening the horses. The slow pace, however, caused engines to overheat and the autos later moved to the front. By 1920, virtually all parade floats were motorized.


Today, the City of St. Louis clings to the tradition of using a horse-drawn entry, featuring the famous Clydesdales.

Dr. Holder's dream created a tradition that would grow beyond all expectations.

The population of Pasadena was only 4,882, in 1890. Today, nearly 1½ million line the 5½-mile parade route, while another 125 million view the event on television.

Fourteen hundred volunteer members of the Tournament annually contribute over 65,000 hours to continue Pasadena's 88-year tradition of sharing its sunshine, roses and flowers every New Year's Day– but now with the entire world.

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

When Association President Carl E. Wopschall selected "The Good Life" as the theme of the 88th Tournament of Roses, he did so "to wish everyone a 'slice of the good life' from Pasadena this New Year's Day."

For President Wopschall, Pasadena *is* "The Good Life." Born just a few blocks from Tournament Park, where Pasadena's New Year's Day football began, he attended Pasadena schools prior to earning his undergraduate and law degrees at the University of Southern California. His law practice is in Pasadena. His father was mayor of the city from 1943 to 1945, and exactly 10 years ago today his daughter, Janet, was a princess in the Tournament's Royal Court.

An avid golfer, Wopschall is an equally enthusiastic football fan. His Rose Bowl Game attendance is a record in itself. Except for the years of World War II, when he served as a naval gunnery officer, he has attended every New Year's Day game since the stadium was built in 1922.

Joining the Tournament of Roses in 1948, he has been a member of 10 committees, besides serving as chairman for eight others. Elected to the Executive Committee in 1971, he has since coordinated an additional 20 committees.

Last spring, Carl and his wife, Lois, traveled over 60,000 miles in behalf of the Association, awarding trophies to 1976 participants, and officially inviting out-of-state bands for 1977.

The Wopschalls reside in Altadena. They have two daughters, Linda J. Shuey of San Marino, and Janet L. Boyer of Costa Mesa; plus two grandchildren, Kimberly Ann Boyer and Craig Carl Shuey.

float judges

Determination of the 1977 Rose Parade float award winners rests with a specially selected panel of three judges.

The evaluation process begins 48 hours prior to the start of the parade. At this time the panel visits the eight decoration sites for an initial inspection of the 61 superstructures. Again on New Year's Eve and before dawn New Year's Day, the trio makes the final assessments.

In addition to meeting the specifications of a particular award, floats are reviewed on the basis of general beauty, execution of parade theme, design excellence, originality, use of flowers and television projection.








1. LONG BEACH MOUNTED POLICE **Ray Paxton, President & Marshal** Jack Green, Captain & Marshal

Displaying the massed red, white and blue colors of the United States, the Long Beach Mounted Police mark 30 years of riding at the forefront of the parade. The posse, featuring 26 matched palominos, is attired in western costumes tailored especially for the Bicentennial Celebration years, 1975, 1976 and 1977. Red shirts and navy trousers are set off with white hats and ties. Heavily trimmed with rhinestones, the shirts are decorated with appliques of large, white roses on the back, yoke and sleeves.





HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS

Walking the "Happy Trails" of the Rose Parade, this towering pair of cowboy boots is in special tribute to the theme song of Grand Marshals Roy Rogers and Dale Evans. The boots are styled with ti leaves and maroon mums to reflect a tooled design of roses. Bronze mums produce a natural leather texture, with lighter tones of gold mums. Golden clover and radish seeds coat the spurs. Tumbling over the tops of the boots are thousands of cascading roses. Calgary was a 1976 parade winner for exceptional merit.


4. TOURNAMENT OF ROSES OFFICIAL BAND PASADENA CITY COLLEGE PASADENA, CALIFORNIA






HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS







Set on a lattice porch under a rose and orchid laden canopy, the scene features a family gathered for an evening together at home. The canopy and supporting columns are solidly covered with some 80,000 white pompon mums. The terraced floor is highlighted with blossoms of pink mums. Four peacocks, measuring 12 feet from beak to tail, are delicately perched around the porch, proudly fanning carnation petaled feathers.




FESTIVAL ARTISTS

The City of Arcadia recalls "The Good Life" at the turn of the century, when a Sunday afternoon often included a tour of the city aboard a horse-drawn streetcar. The petaled horses are pulling the double-decker streetcar down a path of trees flowered with gladiolus and carnations. Rose covered topiary trees ornament the sides of the path. These trees are sculpted of iron and welded into place to form the twigs, branches and limbs. In 1976, Arcadia was presented the Isabella Coleman Award for most effective use of color harmony.

JOHN MARSHALL HIGH SCHOOL "RAM" BAND SAN ANTONIO, TEXAS

An award-winning band, the John Marshall High School contingent is directed by Charles Kuentz, assisted by Loel Briggs. Recent honors include a "Best of Show" in competition at Houston's Astrodome, and a blue ribbon award in San Antonio's '76 Battle of Flowers Parade. The 200 members parade in maroon uniforms, with white overlays and eight inch white fur shakos.

Bubbles fill the air as Dr Pepper's rendition of the classic "Saturday Night Bath" soaps and suds its way along the parade route. The giant, old-fashioned bath tub of gladiolus petals, white mums, delphinium and orchids, is supported by ornate claw feet. The relaxed bather cools his heels in bubbles and wiggles his toes with delight as the breeze from the fan ruffles his hair. Straw, dried materials and gladiolus petals create the realistic quality of the bather. Roses flower the base.


21. CITY OF SOUTH PASADENA, CALIFORNIA "HOBO HEAVEN"





The vines rise from urns and entwine the beams of the open lattice roof. Mexican folk dancers and mariachis perform on an elevated dance floor of inlaid Mexican tiles, an effect created with iris petals. Lawry's was the 1976 recipient of the Mayor's Trophy for originality.



51. CONCORD HIGH SCHOOL MINUTEMEN MARCHING BAND **CONCORD, CALIFORNIA**

Tricornered hats complement the "Minuteman-style" uniforms of the musicians from Concord High School. This marching band was California's representative at the opening ceremonies of the nation's Bicentennial celebration in Massachusetts. 


LAWRENCEBURG HIGH SCHOOL TIGER SHOW BAND LAWRENCEBURG, INDIANA










HERRIN-PRESTON PARADE FLOATS

Entering the Rose Parade for the first time, the City of Carson reflects the community's heritage with a Spanish courtyard scene. Adobe walls of white mums form the backdrop for the gardens of tropical flowers. Decorated with onion seed, the open wrought iron gates reveal a courtyard scene of a young caballero calling on his senorita. Roses and deflexis are entwined to create the bougainvillea vines. Covering the palomino is white rice, clover seed and pampas grass.

MT. MIGUEL HIGH SCHOOL 80. MARCHING MATADOR BAND SPRING VALLEY, CALIFORNIA

The Marching Matadors are making their eighth Tournament of Roses appearance since 1963. Augmenting the 100 musicians is a colorful cape corps. Attired in red jackets, trimmed with black braid, and black pants and shakos, the unit reflects the Spanish heritage of their San Diego County community. Under the direction of Dean Immel, the band's parade repertoire features a Spanish flair.

81. COMMUNITY OF MISSION VIEJO, CALIFORNIA "A DREAM COME TRUE"



Mission Viejo, developed in the tradition of early California Spanish ranches, sponsors its first Rose Parade entry. The Southern California community, located in the southern region of Orange County, is proud to share this floral concept of their hometown. Local characteristics artistically reproduced include Barcelona walls, mission bell street lights, agapanthus plants, hanging baskets of roses and colorful awnings. The oversize agapanthus plants shooting up on the outskirts are specially sculptured, and flowered with sea lavender statice.

Representing the San Diego area in the 1972 Rose Parade, the Helix "Highlander" Band returns in 1977 with an outstanding record of top awards in major competition, including several sweepstakes honors. The "Highlander" Band reflects its Scottish theme in Scots Guard uniforms and lively British and Scottish music arranged especially by Director Gerald Kirk. The 98 musicians feature 10 bagpipers.



FLOAT CONSTRUCTION

Roses, roses and more roses, in brilliant floral designs boasting clever themes...this is the magnificence of the Rose Parade.

These moments of beauty culminate months of planning by float sponsors and decorators. "Rose fever," as Pasadenans call it, officially starts in March with the Tournament president's announcement of the parade theme, which promptly sends designers to their boards. Within weeks the actual construction begins. Averaging \$20,000, floats can cost well over \$40,000, depending on size and degree of animation.

Five of the parade entrants, Burbank, Cal Poly Universities, Downey, Sierra Madre and South Pasadena, self construct and decorate their entries. Other participants contract independent builders.



Artists' renderings provide the basic float design, such as the Credit Unions' 1976 Sweepstakes winner.



Structural checks are a must. Tournament members also inspect the mechanics to prevent breakdowns.

Before flowering, each element of the unit is painted the color of the vegetation that will ultimately cover it.





Individual petals are separated from the blossom and glued onto detail areas.






TRADITION ON PARADE

"The Pasadena Tournament of Roses Story— Tradition on Parade" is an exciting new addition to the Association's vast film library.


Providing both a nostalgic and modern look at the Association, "Tradition on Parade" shows in great detail all the facets and how plans are made and implemented year-around for both the Rose Parade and Rose Bowl Game. It is a tribute and dedication at the same time to the 1,400 volunteer "Men in White" who are the Tournament of Roses.

"Tradition on Parade," filmed in cooperation with the Bank of America and produced by Richard J. Soltys Productions of Burbank, was a year in the making, and covers the beginning (1890), middle and modern eras of the Tournament and Pasadena itself. It was premiered in March of 1976.

More than 2,400 feet of color film was consumed prior to the final edited version of 31 minutes.







Besides Tournament history, "Tradition" chronicles Queen and Court activities, float construction, floral aspects of the parade, equestrians, band and Grand Marshals.

For many, the film offers the first opportunity to see Roy Riegels' unforgettable wrong way turn during the 1929 Rose Bowl Game. The 64yard errant sprint with a fumble made the California player a legend even in defeat.

Prominent footage of the UCLA-Ohio State 1976 Rose Bowl Game is also featured.

"Tradition" replaces another print in the Tournament library, "Backstage at the World's Greatest Parade," which was produced in 1966-1967.

Prints of "Tradition on Parade," along with official Rose Parade films of recent years, are available without charge to interested individuals, groups and organizations by writing the Association's film librarian, 391 South Orange Grove Boulevard, Pasadena, California 91105.

Last year, Tournament of Roses films were shown an average of 108 times a day, every day of the year, somewhere around the world.



Equestrians

Sleek mounts, shining silver trappings and colorful costumes add to the pageantry of New Year's Day in Pasadena. Recognized world-wide as a showcase of the finest equestrian units, the 88th Rose Parade features over 250 equestrians in 34 units grouped according to breeds.


Since 1947, the Long Beach Mounted Police have ridden at the forefront of the parade (center top picture) presenting an awesome site as each member of the 26 matched palomino posse carries the colors of our country.


Through the years many noted western stars, including 1977 Grand Marshal Roy Rogers, have ridden in the five and a half mile parade. Among the famed riders were Bill Boyd (known as Hopalong Cassidy in films), Leo Carrillo, Montie Montana and Lucky Carson.

Montie Montana (center left picture), who thrills parade viewers with his rope tricks, marks his 40th Tournament ride.

All riders are attired in authentic costumes, such as the western, charro, Indian and Arabian units shown in the adjoining pictures. The value of mounts, equipment and costumes in any one parade has been placed in excess of three and a half million dollars.


Many equestrians travel thousands of miles, across the country and frequently from the provinces of Canada, to join with Pasadena in its New Year's greeting to the world.


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the Rose Bowl

The Rose Bowl, "Granddaddy of All Bowl Games," continues to provide the finest football in intercollegiate athletics, all a result of the Rose Bowl pact signed in 1946 by the Big Ten and Pacific-8 (then Pacific Coast) conferences in conjunction with the Pasadena Tournament of Roses Association.

New Year's Day will mark the 31st game under the pact between the Big Ten and Pacific-8, bringing together champions from the nation's two strongest conferences.

Although it has never been suggested that the Rose Bowl hosts a mythical college championship, it certainly has turned out that way. Since the agreement, the Rose Bowl has been the scene of some of the most exciting episodes in football history and has brought together many of the greatest teams in the country. Nine have been judged national champions before or following the game, and all but seven participants were ranked in the Top 10 prior to playing in Pasadena.

Prior to the agreement between the two conferences, there were only five sellouts in the game's then 30-year history. Since then, tickets to every game have been sold out.

The Big Ten Conference leads the series, winning 18 out of the 30 games played to date. The Pacific-8 has won 12 of the encounters, including six out of the last seven played.

The Rose Bowl remains the oldest, largest and finest of all collegiate football classics-making it accurately "The Granddaddy" event!





1977 Rose Bowl Game

USC TROJANS

"We're going home. We're going home!!!"

That was the continuous chant heard in the USC locker room late in November after the Trojans had beaten UCLA for the Pacific-8 Conference football title and berth in the 63rd Rose Bowl Game on New Year's Day against Michigan.

Pasadena on New Year's Day is truly a Trojan "home."

January 1 will find USC in the Granddaddy bowl game for the 21st time, including a fifth appearance in the last six years and seventh in the prior 10 renewals.

And, the Trojans have something to show for it, winning 14 of those contests.

Michigan and USC have split two bowl appearances, with the Trojans winning, 10-3, in 1970 after having been defeated by the Wolverines, 49-0, in 1948.

Of special note, first-year coach John Robinson is the first "rookie" coach in 25 years to reach Pasadena. Standord's Chuck Taylor came in 1951 for the 1952 game.

Yet, it is still Robinson's fifth trip to the Pasadena classic. He played the last 13 seconds for Oregon in 1958, and was an assistant coach at USC three times in 1972–1974. Now, he is bringing his own team.

In Robinson's words, after the victory over UCLA, "I was fortunate to follow a great tradition at USC and a great coach, John McKay. He knew how to get ready for the big games. He also left me a few players."

Among those is tailback Ricky Bell, one of the nation's leading rushers. His next goal is to break Trojan-great Anthony Davis' career rushing record of 3,724 yards (1972–1974). This could well happen during the 1977 Rose Bowl Game.

The 1976 season opened with a 46-25 loss to Missouri. But this was only a reminder of the Trojans of 1974, when they lost the opener then went on to win the national championship, including the 18-17 Rose Bowl win over Ohio State.

Robinson's Trojans were unbeaten in Pacific-8 play (7-0), and had a 9-1 mark over-all going into a November 27 meeting with Notre Dame.

MICHIGAN WOLVERINES

Ending a four-year absence, Bo Schembechler returns to the Rose Bowl with a Michigan team that was ranked No. 1 throughout most of the season—amassing a total of 426 points, and allowing opponents only 81.

The coveted Rose Bowl invitation hinged, for the seventh time in the last eight years, on the outcome of the annual season-ending clash with the Buckeyes of Ohio State. Ohio needed either a win or a tie to clinch the Big Ten championship, while the only answer for the Wolverines was a victory after being upset earlier by Purdue.

Michigan did just that, humiliating the Buckeyes 22-0, thus grabbing the co-championship.

Although both teams finished with 7-1 conference records (Michigan was 10-1 over-all), the Wolverines earned their first trip to Pasadena in five seasons by taking the showdown battle they had to win.

Michigan shared the Big Ten title with Ohio State in 1972, 1973 and 1974, yet was denied the Rose Bowl bid each time, twice by a vote of conference athletic directors and once by a loss to Ohio.

January 1, 1977, marks Michigan's seventh visit to Pasadena, with the first dating back to the original "Granddaddy" of all New Year's Day classics in 1902. Michigan trounced Stanford 49-0.

All in all, the Rose Bowl hasn't been too kind to Schembechler, despite an impressive 76-10-3 won-losttied coaching mark at Michigan. He suffered a heart attack just prior to the 1970 game, as Michigan lost to USC, 10-3. To make things worse, Stanford kicked a last-second field goal to edge out the Wolverines, 13-12, in 1972.

The Wolverines have never won the last game of the season under Bo Schembechler-something they will hope to change on New Year's Day. Perhaps quarterback Rick Leach and tailback Rob Lytle will help to break the jinx for good, and Bo will earn his first Rose Bowl victory.

If so, it will give Michigan an over-all 5-2 Rose Bowl record.

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
Two of Pasadena's noted landmarks are Tournament House, the former William Wrigley Jr. mansion and now home of the Tournament of Roses, and the Pasadena City Hall.


The mansion, constructed over a period of eight years (1906–1914) by Pasadenan George W. Stimson and his famous architect son, G. Lawrence Stimson, was purchased by the chewing gum magnate in 1914, for \$170,000.

For many years, the Rose Parade started in front of the famous address, which prompted the family's heirs to deed the house and grounds to the City of Pasadena in 1958, as the permanent headquarters of the Tournament of Roses.

The mansion, surrounded by the 4½-acre Wrigley Gardens, is open for weekly tours from February through September.

The Pasadena City Hall was built in 1927. While patterned after the classical style of early 16th Century Italian Renaissance, it still maintains the Spanish flavor with a red tile roof and an ornate fountain in its beautiful garden courtyard.

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
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Here are some tips from Kodak photo experts to help make your photography as spectacular as your subject:

• Pick a camera position along the parade route where the sun is at your back and you enjoy a clear view of the line of march.

• Prepare to photograph outstanding parade units by referring to the order of march in this program.

• Load your camera with color film and keep track of how many pictures or how much movie footage you have left to shoot. If you run out of film, look for film vendors along the parade route.

• Picture a poster, flyer or banner announcing the parade and its theme to use as a title for your print set, slide show or movie.

• Include spectators in the foreground of your pictures and movies to help "frame" floats, band units and equestrian teams. But be sure the spectators are looking at the parade, not the camera!

For Snapshooters Only

• Advance your film after every shot and you always will be ready for that special spur-of-the-moment picture opportunity that only happens once.

• When you spot a likely picture subject, take a moment to compose your picture in the viewfinder. Sometimes, if you wait a moment, a busy setting will clear up a bit or your main subject will move closer to the camera and automatically eliminate distracting background.

• Picture parade units as they move directly toward or away from you or when they stop or mark time while other units perform.

• Pan by centering a moving subject in your viewfinder and following it slowly, steadily, pivoting from the waist. Squeeze the shutter release at an opportune moment, while continuing to pan.

• Movement can be part of an exciting still picture so don't wait for all action to stop before you shoot.

• Hold your camera steady and squeeze your shutter release gently every time you shoot. A steady camera hand is especially important if you are using a telephoto lens or a Kodak Tele-Instamatic camera at its telephoto setting.

• Use your camera's telephoto setting to feature float riders or to single out interesting float details.

For Movie-Makers Only

• If your movie camera accepts Kodachrome 40, Ektachrome 40 movie film, or Kodak Ektachrome 160 movie films (type A), match your film choice to the weather. On a bright, sunny day, use Kodachrome 40 or Ektachrome 40 movie film with daylight filter in place. On an overcast day, choose Kodak Ektachrome 160 movie film (type A), with daylight filter, or Kodak (type G) Ektachrome 160 movie film, with no filter, for best results at lower light levels.

• Treat your parade movie as a whole. Each scene should add something new and interesting.

• Vary scene length and camera-to-subject distance.

• Hold your camera still most of the time, allowing your subjects to move through the camera's field of view.

• Keep camera movement to a minimum. Pan-slowly and steadily-pivoting from the waist.

• If your camera has a zoom lens, use the telephoto setting for close-ups. The wide-angle setting can help you establish the setting in which the individual scenes take place.

• Record the sounds of bands as well as spectators with a super 8 camera, such as a Kodak Ektasound movie camera, capable of recording "live" sound.

• Remember to film each sound scene a little longer than you would a silent scene because sound records slightly behind the image on the film.

Finishing Touches

• Take your camera to the Victory Park Post Parade area to fill in close-up details and to add candids of participants to your parade coverage.

• Look for an appropriate closing shot—the aftermath of the parade, a bedraggled spectator, or a discarded banner or sign.

• Edit your parade photography before you share it.

• If you have a projector capable of recording sound, add your own commentary to the "live" sound after processing.

• Have super 8 silent film striped and add appropriate music.

• Share your parade snapshots with someone far away by ordering multiple print sets at the time you take your film in for processing and printing.

• Make this year's photo coverage the first installment in your personal record of the annual Tournament of Roses Parade.

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




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
